

John O'Hara

3.12.1887 - 1974

John O'Hara was the son of Patrick O'Hara and Jane Wilson and was born in Carluke in 1887. Joining local club Law Volunteers, he was spotted by Edinburgh based Hibernian and signed for them in 1908 at the age of 21 years.

In that 1908/09 season Hibs took on Hearts in the cup after a home win over Motherwell secured two league points. The venue was Easter Road and the competition the East of Scotland Shield Final. **John O'Hara** scored twice for Hibs but George Sinclair repeated that feat for the visitors, setting up a replay for later in the season. The Spring of 1909 brought three games after which the season would be finished. Of the three, two were against Hearts with the first of those being the second replay of the East of Scotland Shield Final. Hearts had won the toss to decide the venue but their fans in the 5,000 crowd were disappointed when Hibs lifted the trophy thanks to a 1-0 win with the goal being scored by Willie Smith in the first half. The second meeting was in the semi final of the Rosebery Cup only this time the venue was Easter Road but the outcome was the same, a win for Hibernian. Burns had given the visitors the lead but **John O'Hara** equalised John Sharp struck the winner.

Earlier in 1909 Dundee Hibs (later Dundee United) had taken possession of the Tannadice ground in August 1909. The first game was played there was against Hibs and

"the first goal at Tannadice Park was scored in the opening match at the ground by John O'Hara of (Edinburgh) Hibernian; to mark the occasion he was presented with a bicycle (Dundee Hibernian's secretary and founding father Pat Reilly owned a cycle shop).
