## PREFACE.

THE following Compilations are the result of many years inquiry, prosecuted at first without any view to publication, but merely for the satisfaction of the Author, who was naturally inquisitive upon subjects which he thought interesting to Society. In the course of his researches, he was enabled to detect mistakes, and to correct a variety of errors, which the many imperfect Lists that have been published of the Peerage, the Great Officers of State, the Law, Naval, and Military Officers, had been the means of transmitting into works, whose merit in other respects had justly raised the character of their Authors in the estimation of the world, and by which means these mistakes have become established, and are but too often referred to and consulted. In most of the Histories of Great Britain, and in particular the Parliamentary Histories, when a Nobleman may be the subject either of panegyric or censure, he is only mentioned by his title; and the Reader is left in doubt, where titles have so frequently

fluctuated

fluctuated from one family to another, to know the individual meant to be the object of condemnation or of applause. In like manner, the Officers of State, of the Household, of the Law, &c. are seldom or ever mentioned in History, but by the name of the office they held; by which means, in such a rapid succession of different persons to the same office, the individual is lost among the multitudes who have held the appointment.

The satisfaction which his enquiries gave him in one branch, induced him to extend them to others; and as he daily experienced their utility himself, he was enabled to rectify the information of his friends upon such subjects as he had examined; and, encouraged by them to proceed, he was led to hope, that his labours, when properly arranged and methodized, might prove a convenient and useful publication.

Such have been the inducements to offer this work to the Public: the objects of which are, in the first place, To form a sort of Political Index to the Histories of Great Britain and Ireland, where the individuals may be found, and their rank and political connections traced, whose measures may be the subject of historical information: Secondly, To supply a correct Register of the great and respectable body of the Peerage of each of the Kingdoms, from their original creation; ascertaining and explaining their rise to higher dignities, when their titles were transferred into other families, when forfeited, or when extinct. And, lastly, to arrange the other numerous official lists, which the Author has been at great pains to render cor-

rect, from the earliest to the latest periods, in such a manner as, by reference from one to another, to elucidate to the reader of modern history the æra of every successive Administration, and to present to his view the whole groupe of persons acting in conjunction with the ostensible Minister.

The Author is indebted for the chief of his materials, in compiling the following Lists, to Sir William Dugdale's Summonses to Parliament, the Historical Register, and a variety of Chronicles and Peerages; and he has endeavoured to render the several Lists as accurate as the various authorities he had to consult (who frequently differ from each other) would allow of.

He cannot express his thanks in terms sufficiently strong for the very large and respectable Subscription with which he has been honoured; and he hopes to be pardoned for having divided his Work into three parts, and arranging it as he has done. This proceeded from his being under the necessity of employing several Printers at the same time, in order to expedite the publication, because he was determined to keep good faith with his Subscribers as to the time he promised them the Book.



## PREFACE

TO THE

## SECOND EDITION.

The flattering judgment passed on the Political Index by a Work of the first critical merit, and a very rapid sale of the First Edition, having satisfied the Author that his labours had met with approbation, he has been encouraged to prosecute them with renewed ardour, to render the Second Edition (which is now offered to the Public) still more comprehensive than the First, and carefully to rectify such errors as had crept into it, which it is almost impossible entirely to avoid in a very extensive work of this nature. He would fain flatter himself, however, that his assiduity will be discovered in the accuracy of the present Edition.

The very polite and liberal reception which he met with from several distinguished characters in Londou, by which both public and private repositories were submitted to his examination and research, having enabled him to trace the descent of many ancient baronies to different noble families beyond the limits of his former information, he hopes that the List of the Peerage will now be found considerably improved. Upon this occasion, he cannot

help expressing his gratitude for the aid of every sort, which, both in England and Scotland, he has received from respectable individuals. To render this important and principal branch of his Work, which is so complicated and extensive, as perspicuous as possible, he has formed an Index for the Peerage of the three Kingdoms, which he hopes will be found to make references commodious and easy. The other Lists he has endeavoured to amend in arrangement, in order to make them more convenient and accessible; and some of them he has considerably enlarged, particularly those of the Revenue Boards, the Law Departments, and the Provincial Governors. To this Edition is also added, a List of the Speakers of the House of Commons; and to render the Work of still more extensive utility, a List of the Emperors, Kings, and principal Potentates of Europe, with an account of their respective Families.

In a Supplement, some account is given of the business transacted, and the profits received, at the respective Offices of the Paymaster General of the Land Forces, the Treasurer of the Navy; and in the Exchequer, of the Auditor, Tellers, Clerk of the Pells, &c. &c.

These additions and improvements, together with the continuation of the Modern Lists down to the latest dates, are of such magnitude as to have swelled the Work nearly to double its original size. The value of such a Compilation being proportioned to the state of perfection to which its component parts are brought, the Author's endeavours to attain this desirable end, he hopes, will be found to have increased the utility of his Work even beyond the additional size it has now acquired.


### THIRD EDITION.

## POLITICAL INDEX.

## OF THE DIFFERENT DEGREES OF NOBILITY.

THE Degrees of Nobility in Great Britain and Ireland are Five; viz. Dukes, Marquisses, Earls, Viscounts, and Barons; to which may be added a Sixth, viz. the Bishops, as they are from that dignity entitled to a seat in the House of Peers.

DUKE is now the first rank of nobility; but it was the eleventh of Edward III, before this dignity was introduced into England, when his eldest son, commonly called the Black Prince, was created Duke of Cornwall. The only ceremony at his investiture, was girding him with the sword. When John of Gaunt, son of King Edward III. was created Duke of Lancaster, by the same Monarch, he had investiture, not only by the King's girding him with the sword, but by putting on him a cap of fur, under a coronet of gold set with precious In the twenty-first year of King Richard II. the Duke of Hereford, and several others, were created by putting a cap of honour on their heads, and by delivering a rod into their hands; then the surcoat, mantle, hood, and patent, were introduced with much ceremony; all which is now omitted, they being now created by pa-The mantle and surcoat which a Duke wears at the coronation of a King or Queen is of crimson velvet, lined with white taffeta, and the mantle is doubled from the neck till below the elbow with ermine, having four rows of spots on each shoulder. His Parliamentary robes are of fine scarlet cloth, lined with white taffeta, and is doubled

doubled with four guards of ermine at equal distances, with gold lace above each guard, and is tied up to the left shoulder by a black ribbon. His cap is of crimson velvet, lined with ermine, having a gold tassel on the too; and his coronet, which is of gold also, is set round with flowers, in the shape of strawberry-leaves. He is styled, His Grace; and usually styled by the King or Queen, Our Right Trusty and Right Entirely Beloved Coasin; and it of the Privy Council, then with the addition of Coanseller. His title, The High and Mighty Prince.

MARQUIS .- This dignity, which is called by the Saxons Markin Reve, and by the Germans Markgrave, took its original from Mark or March, which, in the language of the northern nations, is a limit or bound, and their office was to guard or govern the frontiers of a This title, which hath the next place of honour to a Duke, was introduced several years after that title had been established in England; and the first on whom it was conferred, was the great favourite of King Richard II. Robert de Vere, Earl of Oxford, who was created Marquis of Dublin, and by him placed in Parliament between the Dukes and Earls. The creation to this dignity was with nearly the same ceremony as that of a Duke; but they are now created by patent under the Great Seal. His coronation robes are of crimson velvet, lined with white taffeta, and has four guards of ermine on the right side, and three on the left, set at equal distances, with gold lace above each guard, and is tied up to the left shoulder by a ribbon. His cap is of crimson velvet, lined with ermine, having a gold tassel at top. His coronet is of gold, and has pearls and strawberry-leaves, mixed alternately round, of equal height. His title, is Most Noble and Puissant Prince; and he is styled by the King or Queen, Our Right Trusty and Entirely Beloved Cousin.

EARLS.—This honour, which came from the Saxons, was of great dignity and power, and for many ages continued the highest rank in England, till King Edward III. created Dukes, and Richard II. created Marquisses, both of whom had precedency assigned above They had anciently, for the support of their state, the third penny out of the sheriff's court, issuing out of the pleas of the shire whereof they had their title; as in ancient times there were no Counts or Earls but had a county or shire for his Earldom: Afterwards, the number of Earls increasing, they took their title from some eminent town or village, or even from their own seat or park; and some from illustricus families, as Salisbury, Peterborough, Stamford, Paulet, Cholmondeley, Ferrers, Waldegrave, Stanhope, Ashburnham, Go. Go. Nor were titles confined to England alone, as some were taken from the king lom of France, as Albemarle and Tankerville. Upon the increase of Earls, their revenue ceased, and their powers were much abridged; and it became the custom of the kings of England to assign some stated pension to the person whom he ennobled, for the better support of his dignity; and it was commonly done in the following proportion: Viscounts a fee of twenty merks, Earls of L.20, Marquisses of forty merks, and Dukes of L.40, out of some particular part of the royal revenue. A creation-fee to Barons has not yet been settled; but Charles I. when he created Montjoy Blount, Lord Montjoy of Thurveston in Derbyshire, he assigned to him and his heirs-male, a creation-fee of twenty merks per annum. Anciently an Earl was created with nearly the same ceremony as a Duke or Marquis; but they are now created by letters patent. His coronation robe is the same as a Duke or a Marquis, except that he has only three rows of spots. His Parliamentary robes are the same as a Duke or a Marquis, except that he has only three guards of ermine and gold lace. His cap is the same as theirs. It is uncertain when the coronets of Dukes, Marquisses and Earls, were settled. Sir Robert Cecil, Earl of Salisbury, Viscount Cranbourn, was the first of that degree that wore a coronet. An Earl's coronet has pearls raised upon points, and strawberry-leaves low between them. His title is, Right Honourable; and he is styled by the King or Queen, Our Right Trusty and Right Well Beloved Cousin.

VISCOUNT—was anciently the name of an office under an Earl, Vice Comer, who being oftentimes required at court, was his deputy to look after the affairs of the county; but, in the reign of Henry VI. it became a degree of honour, and was made hereditary. The first Viscount in England, created by patent was John Lord Beaumont, who was by the above King created Viscount Beaumont, and he gave him precedence above all Barons. He is created by letters patent. His coronation robes are the same as an Earl's, except that he has only two rows of plain white fur; and the same distinction on his Parliamentary robes. His cap is the same; and his coronet is surrounded with a row of pearls close to the chaplet. His style is, Right Honourable; and he is styled by the King or Queen, Our Right Trusty and Well Beloved Cousin.

Bisnors—The precedence of Bishops was settled by statute 31st the Realm. Chap. x. to be next to Viscounts, they being Barons of the Realm. They have the title of Lorde, and Right Reverend Fathers in Gad. Before the Saxons came into England, there were in that kingdom three Archbishopricks, viz. London, York, and Caerleon upon Usk; each of which had many suffragans; but, soon after St. Augustine's arrival in England, he, from the great kindness he received from the King of Kent, settled the Metropolitan See at Canterbury, where it has continued ever since. York continued Archiepiscopal, but London and Caerleon lost that dignity. The latter was situated too near the Saxons to be much at ease; so one of its Bishops removed the See to St David's in Wales. The Archbishop of

Canterbury is the first Peer in Great Britain, next the Royal Family. The Lord High Chancellor is the next, and the Archbishop of York is the third; they taking place of all Dukes, and have the title of Grace given them. The Archbishop of Canterbury writes himself, By Divine Providence; but the Archbishop of York, and the other Bishops, Br. Divine Permirrion. The Bishops of London, Durham, and Winchester, have precedence of all Bishops; the others rank according to the seniority of consecration.

BARON-This dignity, which is either by writ or patent, is extremely ancient, and its original name in England was Vavassour, which, by the Saxons, was changed into Thane, and by the Normans into Baron. Many of this rank are named in the history of England, and undoubtedly had assisted, or been summoned to Parliament; but such is the deficiency of public records, that the first precept to be found is of no higher date than the 40th year of King Henry III.; which, although it was issued out in the King's name, it was neither by his authority nor by his direction; for, not only the King himself, but his son Prince Edward, and most of the nobility who stood loval to him, were then prisoners in the hands of the rebellious Barons; having been so made in the month of May preceeding, at the battle of Lewes, and so continued until the memorable battle of Evesham, which happened in August the year following; when, by the happy escape of Prince Edward, he rescued the King and his adherents out of the hands of Simon Mountfort, Earl of Leicester. It cannot be doubted but that several Parliaments were held by King Henry III. and King Edward I.; yet no record is to be found giving any account thereof, (except the 5th of King Edward I.), until the 22d year of the reign of the last mentioned King \*.

Some of the Barons were only summoned once. Such will be found marked thus \* in the following work; and, when the summons has not been continued to their heirs, the years they were summoned will be mentioned after their names. When a Baron is called up to the House of Peers by writ of summons, the writ is in the King's name, and he is directed to come to the Parliament appointed to be held at a certain time and place, and there to treat and advise with his Majesty, the prelates, and nobility, about the weighty affairs of the nation. The ceremony of the admission of a Baron into the House of Peers is thus: He is brought into the House between two Barons, who conduct him up to the Lord Chancellor, his patent, or writ of summons, being carried by a King at Arms, who presents it kneeling to the Lord Chancellor, who reads it, and then congratulates him on his becoming a member of the House of Peers, and invests him with his Parliamentary robe. The patent is then delivered to the Clerk of the Parliament, and the oaths are administered to the new Peer, who is then conducted to his seat on the Barons Bench. Some Barons hold their seats by tenure. The first who was raised to this dignity by patent, was John de Beauchamp of Holt Castle, created Baron of Kidderminster, in Worcestershire, to him and his heirsmale, by King Richard II. in the 11th year of his reign. He invested him with a mantle and cap. The coronation robes of a Baron are the same as an Earl's, except that he has only two rows of spots on each shoulder. In like manner, his Parliamentary robes have but two guards of white fur, with rows of gold lace. In other respects they are the same as other Peers. King Charles II. granted a coronet to the Barons. It has six pearls, set at equal distances on the chaplet. His cap is the same as a Viscount's. His style is, Right Honourable; and he is styled by the King or Queen, Right Trusty, and Well Beloved.

### Scots and IRISH PEERS.

Scots Peers take place before all those of the same rank created since the Union. And Peers of Ireland, according to their dignity, take place immediately after the youngest of their rank of British Peers.

### The GREAT OFFICERS who precede DUKES.

There are some high Officers who, by virtue of their office, take place of all Dukes that are not of the blood-royal, viz. The Lord High Chancellor, or Lord Keeper, Lord High Treasurer, The Lord President of the Privy Council, and The Lord Keeper of the Privy Seal; and others that take place only of all such Peers as are of the

same dignity as themselves, viz. Lord Great Chamberlain of England, The Lord High Constable, Earl Marshal, The Lord High Admiral, The Lord Chamberlain of the Houshold, and The Lord Steward of the Houshold. A Secretary of State being a Baron, takes place of all Barons that are not in any of the high stations above mentioned; but, if he be of a higher degree of Peerage than a Baron, then he only takes place according to his degree.


### The PRIVILEGES of PEERS of GREAT BRITAIN.

The nobility of England enjoy many great privileges, the principal of which are as follows:

- 1. That they are free from all arrests for debts, as being the King's hereditary Counsellors. Therefore a Peer cannot be outlawed in any civil action; and no attachment lies against his person; but execution may be taken upon his lands and goods. For the same reason, they are free from all attendance at Courts Leet, or Sheriff's Turns; or in case of a riot, from attending the Posse Comitatus.
- 2. In criminal causes, they are only tried by their Pecrs, who give in their verdict, not upon oath, as other juries, but only upon their honour. And then a court is built on purpose in the middle of Westmirsels Hall, at the King's charge, which is pulled down when their trials are over.
- 3. To secure the bonour of, and prevent the spreading of any scandal, upon Peers, or any great officer of the realm, by reports, there is an express law, called Scandalum Magnatum, by which any man convicted of making a scandalous report against a Peer of the realm, (though true), is condemned to an arbitrary fine, and to remain in prison till the same be paid.
- 4. Upon any great trial in a court of justice, a Peer may come into the court, and sit there covered,

No Peer can be covered in the Royal Presence, without permission so to be, except the Lord Baron of Kinsale, of his Majesty's kingdom of Ireland.

In case of a poll-tax, the Peers bear the greatest share of the burden, they being taxed every one according to his degree.

She married, 1st, Richard, third Earl of Dorset; 2dly, Philip, fourth Earl of Pembroke. By this last she had no issue; by the first she had issue two daughters. Lady Margaret Sackville, the eldest, was married to John, second Earl of Thanet, and had issue. ### ARCHBISHOPS AND BISHOPS.

THE ecclesiastical government of England is divided into two provinces, viz. Canterbury and York. Canterbury hath the following suffragan bishopricks appertaining to it; St Asaph, Bangor, Bath and Wells, Bristol, Chichester, Litchfield and Coventry, St David's, Ely, Exeter, Gloucester, Hereford, Landass, Lincoln, London, Norwich, Oxford, Peterborough, Rochester, Salisbury, Winchester, and Worcester. To York appertain the bishopricks of Carlisle, Chester, and Durham; to which may be alded the bishoprick of Sodor and Man, whose Bishop is not a Lord of Parlioment.

### CANTERBURY.

This see was the first settled in England, by Austin, a Monk, who first preached the gospel in England; and, converting Ethelbert, King of Kent, he, animated with great zeal for his new religion, bestowed great favours on Austin, who hereupon fixed his residence in the capital of Ethelbert's dominions. The church was made a cathedral, repaired, consecrated, and dedicated to the name of Christ, which it still retains, although, for a considerable space of time, it was better known by the name of St Thomas, from Thomas Becket, whose name is a reproach to the kalendar of Saints, who was murdered in it. The present fabric was begun by Archbishop Lanfrane and William Corbois, and greatly augmented by several of their successors. During the grand rebellion, it suffered much; the usurper Cromwell having made a stable of it for his dragoons. After the restoration, it was repaired, and made what it now appears.

This diocese contains 257 parishes, besides chapels, in Kent, and about 100 more in other dioceses. These are called Peculiars : it being an ancient privilege of this see, that, wheresoever the Archbishops had either manors or advowsons, the place was exempted from the jurisdiction of the ordinary of the diocese, where it was situated, and was deemed in the diocese of Canterbury. The see is valued in the King's books at L.2816: 17: 94. but is reckoned to produce a clear revenue of L.8000 a-year. The clergy's tenths come to L.651: 18: 27. This see had many great privileges in the time of Popery, some of which it still retains. The Archbishop is accounted Primate and Metropolitan of all England, and is the first Peer in the realm; having the precedence of all Dukes not of the blood-royal, and all the great officers of state. In common speech he is styled His Grace, and he writes himself Divina Providentia; whereas other Bishops style themselves Divina Permissione. At Coronations, he places the Crown on the King's head \*; and, wherever the Court may be, the King and Queen are the proper domestic parishioners of the Archbishop of Canterbury. The Bishop of London is accounted his Provincial Dean, the Bishop of Winchester his Sub-Dean, the Bishop of Lincoln his Chancellor, and the Bishop of Rochester his Chaplain.

This see hath yielded to the Church 18 saints, to the Church of Rome o Cardinals, to the civil state of England 12 Lord Chancellors, 4 Lord Treasurers, 1 Lord Chief Justice, and 9 Chancellors to the University of Oxford.

To this see belongs only one Archdeacon, viz. of Canterbury. To the Cathedral belong an Archbishop, a Dean, a Chancellor, an Archdeacon, 12 Prebends, 6 Preachers, 6 Minor Canons, 6 Substitutes, 12 Lay Clerks, 10 Choristers, 2 Masters, 50 Scholars, and 12 Almsmon.

The present Dean is Thomas Powis, D. D. - Official Principal, Right Hon, Sir W. Wynne, Knt. D.L.L. Vicar General, Right Hon. Sir Wm. Scott, knt. Archdeacon, Houstoune Radcliffe, D.D.

### Sr. ASAPH.

This Bishoprick is of great antiquity, and was founded about the year 560, by Kentigern, a Scotsman, Bishop of Glasgow. He began the Church on the banks of the river Elwy, whence it is called by the Welsh Land Elwy, and in Latin Elwensis. Kentigern returning into Scotland, left a holy man his successor, St Asaph. Who was his successor is uncertain, as there are no records that mention it;

and it seems rather probable that the religious settled here had been necessitated to remove to some more peaceful abode, as the country was frequently the seat of war between the English and the Welsh. This see was formerly a very wealthy one; but its revenues were greatly lessened by the profusion of Bishop Parfew, who alienated much of the lands belonging to this Bishoprick.

This diocese does not contain any one whole county, but consists of part of Denbigh, Flint, (where its church is,) Montgomery, and Merioneth shires, and a small part of Shropshire; wherein are 121 parishes, and 131 churches and chapels, most of which are in the immediate patronage of the Bishop. This see hath but one Archdeaconry, viz. that of St Asaph, which is united to the Bislioprick, for the better maintenance thereof. This see is valued in the King's books are L. 187: 11:6. but computed to be worth annually L. 1500. The tenth of the clergy comes to L.186: 19:63. To this cathedral belong a Bishop, a Dean, Archdeacon, Chancellor, &c.

# BANGOR.

The founder of the see of Bangor, in Carnarvonshire, is unknown. It is of very great antiquity; and the church is dedicated to St Daniel, who was Bishop here about the year 516; but, for near five hundred years afterwards there is no certainty of the names of his successors. Owen Glendower greatly defaced the cathedral church; but Bishop Dean repaired it again. This see met a still more cruel ravager than Owen Glendower, in the person of Bishop Bulkeley, who not only alienated many of the lands belonging to it, but even sold the bells of the church.

This diocese contains the whole of Carnarvonshire, except three parishes, the shire of Anglesey, and part of the shires of Denbigh, Merioneth, and Montgomery; in which are 107 parishes, whereof 36 impropriate. It has three Archdeaconries, viz. Bangor, Anglesey, and Merioneth, of which the two first are commonly annexed to the bishoprick, for its better support. This see is valued in the King's books at L.131: 16: 4, and is computed to be worth annually L.1200. The tenths of the clergy are L.151: 14: 34.

To the cathedral there belongs a bishop, a dean, an archdeacon, a treasurer, and two prebendaries, endowed; a precentor, a chancellor, and three canons, not endowed; three vicars choral, an organist, layclerks, choristers, and two officers.

#### BATH AND WELLS.

This diocese, although it hath a double name, is but one bishoprick. The Bishop's seat is at Wells, whose cathedral church was built by Ina, King of the West Saxons in 704, and by him dedicated to St Andrew. Several other of the West Saxon Kings endowed it, and it was erected into a bishoprick in 905, during the reign of King Edward the Elder. The present church was begun by Robert the 18th bishop of this see, and completed by his immediate successor .--John de Villula, the 16th Eishop, having purchased the city of Bath for 500 merks of King Henry 1. transferred his seat to that city in 1088. From this, disputes arose between the Monks of Bath, and the Canons of Wells, about the election of a Bishop; but they were at last compromised by Robert the 18th Bishop, who decreed, that from henceforward the Bishop should be stiled from both places, and that the precedency should be given to Bath; 'that, in the vacancy of the see, the Bishop should be elected by a certain number of delegates from both churches; and that he should be installed in them both. Both of them to constitute the Bishop's Chapter; and all his grants and patents to be confirmed in both. So it stood till the Reformation. But in the 35th of King Henry VIII. an act of parliament passed, for the Dean and Chapter of Wells to make one sole Chapter for the Bishop. This diocese hath yielded to the Church of Rome one Cardinal, and to the civil state of England six Lord Chancellors; five Lord Treasurers, one Lord Privy Seal, one Lord President of Wales,

and Principal Secretary of State. The diocese contains the whole county of Somerset, except a few churches in the city of Bristol; the number of parishes amounting to 388, and the churches and chapels to 503. Of the parishes 160 are impropriate. It is valued in the King's books at L.535:1:3, and computed to be worth annually I.2200. The clergy's tenths is L.355:18:9\frac{1}{2}.

To the cathedral belong a bishop, a dean, three archdeacons, a chancellor, a treasurer, a sub-dean, fifty-nine prebendaries, four priest-vicars, eight lay-vicars, an organist, six choristers, and other officers.

### BRISTOL.

This diocese was one of the six sees erected by King Henry VIII.
out of the spoils of the monasteries and religious houses, which that
monarch

monarch had got dissolved. The Cathedral Church was the church of the Abbey of St Austin in Bristol, founded by Robert FitzHarding, son to a King of Denmark, once a citizen here, by him filled with canons regular, in the year 1148. At the reformation, King Henry VIII. placed therein a Dean and six Prebendaries, which mode of government still continues. During a great part of Queen Elizabeth's reign, this see was held in commendam by the Bishop of Gloucester. This diocese was formed chiefly out of the diocese of Salisbury, with a small part from the dioceses of Wells and Worcester. It contains most of the city of Bristol, and all the county of Dorset, in which are 236 parishes, of which 64 are impropriate. It has only one Archdeaconry, viz. of Dorset; is valued in the King's books L.338: 8: 4. and is computed to be annually worth L.1500, including its commendams. The tenths of the Clergy, L.353: 18:03. This see hath yielded to the state one Lord Privy Seal.

The revenues of the Abbey of St Augustine, or St Austin, in Bristol, were valued at the dissolution at L.670: 13: 11. when it was erected into a cathedral by King Henry VIII. by the name of the Cathedral Church of the Holy Trinity.

To this cathedral belongs a bishop, a dean, an archdeacon, a chancellor, six prebendaries, and other inferior officers and servants.

### CHICHESTER.

Wilfride, the third Archbishop of York, having been obliged to fly his country by Egfrid, King of Northumberland, came and preached the gospel in these parts, and Edilwach, King of the South Saxons, gave him the Isle of Selsey, not far from Chichester, for his seat, where he built a church. Cedwal, King of the West Saxons, having won Edilwach's kingdom, built a monastery in the island of Selsey, which he afterwards got erected into a bishoprick. Here the seat of this see continued, till Stigand, the twenty-third Bishop of Selsey. got it removed to Chichester, the principal city in these parts, built by Cissa, the second King of the South Saxons, and by him called Cissan Caester. The cathedral church was anciently dedicated to St Peter; was new-built by Radulph, the twenty-fifth Bishop; but this fabric being destroyed by fire, the church was again built by Seffridus II. the twenty-ninth Bishop. This see hath yielded to the church two saints, and to the nation three Lord Chancellors, two Almoners, and one Chancellor to the University of Oxford. Anciently the Bishops of Chichester were Confessors to the Queens of England. This diocese contains the whole of the county of Sussex, (excepting 22 parishes, peculiars of the Archbishop of Canterbury), wherein are 250 parishes, whereof 112 are impropriate. It hath two Archdeacons, viz. of Chichester and Lewes, and is valued in the King's books at L.67. 715. 3d. and is computed to be worth annually L.2600. The tenths of the whole clergy is L.287: 2: 03.

To the cathedral belongs a Bishop, a Dean, two Archdeacons, a Treasurer, a Chancellor, thirty-two Prebendaries, a Chanter, twelve Vicars-Choral, and other officers.

#### COVENTRY AND LITCHFIELD.

This Bishoprick is said to be founded by Oswy, King of Mercia, in the year 656 or 657; and, although it hath a double name, yet, like Bath and Wells, it is a single diocese. It was so extremely wealthy, that King Ossa, by the favour of Pope Adrian, constituted it an archiepiscopal see; but this title was laid aside on the death of that King. In 1075, Peter, the thirty-fourth Bishop, removed the see to Chester; and, in 1102, Robert de Limsey, his immediate successor, removed it to Coventry; and Hugo Novant, the forty-first Bishop, removed it back to Litchfield, but with great opposition from the Monks of Coventry; and the dispute was finally settled in a manner nearly-similar to that which is mentioned between Bath and Wells. Here it was agreed that the Bishop should be styled from both places, and that Coventry should have the precedence; that they should chuse the Bishop alternately; and that they should both make one chapter to the Bishop, in which the Prior of Coventry should be the chief man. Matters continued thus till the Reformation, when the Priory of Coventry being dissolved by King Henry VIII, the style of the Bishop continued as before. But an act of Parliament passed, 33d of King Henry VIII. to make the Dean and chapter of Litchfield one sole chapter to the Bishop. This see hath given three saints to the church, and to the nation one Lord Chancellor, three Lord Treasurers, three Presidents of Wales, one Chancellor to the University of Cambridge, and one Master of the Wardrobe.

The old church built by King Oswy being taken down by Roger de Clinton, the thirty-seventh Bishop, he built the beautiful fabric that now stands in 1148, and dedicated it to the Virgin Mary and St Chad. During the grand rebellion, the church suffered much; but, soon after the Restoration, it was repaired and beautified.

This diocese contains the whole counties of Stafford and Derby (except two parishes of the former), the largest part of Warwickshire, and near only one half of Shropshire, in which are 555 parishes, of which 250 are impropriate. It hath four archdeaconries, viz. Stafford, Derby, Coventry, and Shrewsbury. It is valued in the King's books at L.559: 18: 2\frac{3}{4}, and is computed to be worth annually L.2800.—The clergy's tenth is L.590: 16: 11\frac{1}{4}.

# ST DAVID's.

This see, now the seat of a suffragan Bishop, was once the metropolitan see of Wales, and archi-episcopal; and for many years the seat of

of the Supreme Ordinary of the Welch. When Christianity was first planted in Great Britain, there were three Archbishops seats appointed, viz. London, (afterwards removed to Canterbury), York, and Caerleon up Usk, in Monmouthshire. That at Caerleon being found to be too near to the dominions of the Saxons, was removed, in the time of Arthur King of the Britons, to a place called Menew, in the farthermost part of Pembrokeshire; but since, in honour of the Archbishop who translated it here, it is called St David's. It is from the first name that the Bishops style themselves Menevensis. Bishop Sampson was the last of the Archbishops of St David's; for he, withdrawing himself, on account of a pestilence which raged here, to Dole in Britanny, he carried the pall with him. Yet his successors, though they lost the name, still preserved the archiepiscopal power; for the Welch Bishops still continued to receive consecration at his hands, till the reign of Henry I. when Bernard, the 47th Bishop, was forced to submit himself to the church of Canterbury,

The church standing so near the sea, frequently felt the desolating hand of the Danes, Norwegians, and other pirates, and was spoiled and ruined. The church that now remains was erected by Bishop Peter, the 49th Bishop, and was dedicated to St Andrew and St David; though now St Andrew be left out. It hath given one saint to the church, and to the nation three Lord Treaswers, one Lord Privy Seal, a Chancellor to the Queen, and another to the University of Oxford. This diocese contains the entire counties of Pembroke, Carmarthen, Brecknock, and Radnor (five parishes of the latter excepted), with some small parts of Monmouth, Hereford, Montgomery, and Glamorganshires, in which are no more than 308 parishes, whereof 120 are impropriate. It hath four Archdeaconries, viz. Cardigan, Carmarthen, Brecknock, and St David's. The see is valued in the King's books at L.457: 1: 104, and is computed to be worth annually L.1402. The clergy's tenths amount to L.336: 14: 10.

To this cathedral belong a Bishop, a Precentor with the power of a Dean, a Chancellor, a Treasurer, four Archdeacons, nineteen Prebendaries, eight Vicars-choral, four Choristers, and other inferior officers.

#### ELY.

This church hath undergone various alterations since it was first established by Etheldra, the wife of Egfride, King of Northumberland, who founded a religious house here, and planted it with virgins, and became the first Abbess of it herself. The Danes entirely ruined this establishment: then Ethelwald, the 27th Bishop of Winchester, rebuilt the monastery, and filled it with Monks; to whom King Edgar, and many succeeding Monarchs, bestowed many privileges and great grants of land; so that this Abbey became, in process of time, the best of any in England. Richard, the eleventh Abbot, wishing to free himself of the Bishop of Lincoln, within whose diocese his monastery was situated, and not liking so powerful a superior, he made

great

great interest with King Henry I. to get Ely erected into a Bishoprick; and spared neither purse nor prayers to bring this about. He even brought the Bishop of Lincoln to consent to it, by giving him and his successors the manors of Bugden, Biggleswade, and Spalding, which belonged to the Abbey, in lieu of his jurisdiction; but he lived not to taste the sweets of his industry and ambition, he dying before his Abbey was erected into a see. His successor was the first Bishop of Ely; but the great privileges the Bishop enjoyed were almost wholly taken away, or much restricted, by the act of Parliament 27th Henry VIII. regarding the restoring to the Crown the ancient royalties: So, instead of being Palatine of the isle of Ely, the Bishop, and his temporal steward, were by that act declared to be from thenceforth Justices of the Peace in the said island. This diocese contains all Cambridgeshire, and the isle of Ely, excepting Iselham, which belongs to the see of Rochester, and 15 other parishes, that are in the diocese of Norwich; but it has a parish in Norfolk, viz. Emneth .-The number of parishes in this diocese are 141, whereof 75 are impropriate. It hath but one Archdencon, viz. of Ely. It is valued in the King's books at L.2134: 18: 5. The clergy's tenth, amounting to the sum of L.384: 14: 94. The Bishoprick is computed to be worth annually L.4000.

The church is dedicated to St Ethelred. The building, as it now appears, has been the work of several of its Bishops. The west parts were rebuilt by Bishop Ridal; the choir and lanthern were begun by Bishop Norwald, and finished by Bishop Frodsham.

This see hath given two saints and two Cardinals to the church of Rome; and to the English nation nine Lord Chancellors, seven Lord Treasurers, one Lord Privy Seal, one Chancellor of the Exchequer, one Chancellor to the University of Oxford, two Masters of the Rolls, and three Almoness.

To this cathedral belong a Bishop, a Dean, an Archdeacon, eight Prebendaries, with Vicars, Lay-clerks, Choristers, a Schoolmaster, Usher, and twenty-eight King's Scholars.

### EXETER.

This diocese contains what formerly constituted two Bishopricks, viz. Devonshire and Cornwall. The church of the former was at Crediton, and of the latter at Bodmin. About the year 1032, the Bishoprick of Cornwall was united to that of Devonshire; and, soon after, the then Bishop removed the see to Exeter, the largest and best city in those parts, where it still continues. The cathedral church of Exeter belonged to a monastery founded by King Athelstane, and by him dedicated to St Peter. King Edward the Confessor removed all the Monks to his new Abbey of Westminster, and gave this church for a cathedral to the united Bishopricks of Devonshire and Cornwall.

Little now remains of the ancient fabric of the church, except that part which is called our Lady's Chapel. The choir was built by Bishop Warlewast, the body of the church by Bishop Quivil, and the side isles by Bishop Grandison. This see was once one of the most wealthy in the kingdom; but its revenues were most shamefully wasted by Bishop Voysey, who alienated its lands; and what little he left was so much incumbered, that the see has never been able to recover its former grandeur; and, so small are its present revenues, that it has been found necessary for the Bishop to hold some other preferment for the better support of his dignity and rank.

This see hath yielded to the nation three Lord Chancellors, two Lord Treasurers, one Lord President of Wales, and one Chancellor to the University of Oxford. This diocese contains the entire counties of Devonshire and Cornwall, wherein are 604 parishes, whereof 230 are impropriate. It hath four Archdeacons, viz. of Cornwall. Exeter, Barnstaple, and Totness. This diocese was formerly valued in the King's books at L.1556: 14:6. but, since Bishop Voysey's time, it is lowered to L.500, and is computed to be worth annually L.2700. The clergy's tenths is L.1200: 15: 21/2.

To the Cathedral belong a Bishop, a Dean, four Archdeacons, a Chancellor, a Treasurer, a Chantor, twenty-four Probendaries, and other inferior officers and servants.

#### GLOUCESTER.

This see was one of the six erected by King Henry VIII. in the year 1541, and was formerly part of the diocese of Worcester. The cathedral church was the church belonging to the Abbey here, which was dissolved by the above King, and its revenues appropriated to the maintenance of the Bishop. This diocese comprehends all Gloucestershire, (two chapelries excepted), Bristol Deanery, and the parish of Kingswood, in Wiltshire, containing 236 parishes, whereof 125 are impropriate. It has only one Archdeacon, viz. that of Gloucester. The see is valued in the King's books at L.315:17:2. and is computed to be worth annually L.2000; and the clergy's tenth is L358:15:0.

#### HEREFORD.

This see was a Bishoprick in the Britons time, and one of the suffragains to the metropolitan see of St David's. When this country was conquered by the Saxons, it became a member of the province of Canterbury. The cathedral church was founded by Milfride, a nobleman of this country, in honour of Ethelbert, King of the East Angles, treacherously made away with by the Queen of Mercia, his intended mother-in-law. The present church was built by Rainelm, the 30th Bishop, and what he left undone, was finished by his successors. This see hath given two Saints to the Church, and to the state two Loid Chancellors, three Lord Treasurers, one Lord Deputy of Ireland, one Chancellor to the Queen, and two Chancellors to the University of Oxford.

The diocese contains the county of Hereford, (except eleven churches and chapels, which belong to the see of St David's,) the better half of Shropshire; four parishes in Monmouthshire; six in Montgomeryshire; eight in Radnorshire; and twenty-one in Worcestershire; making in all 313 parishes, of which 162 are impropriations. It has two Archdeacons, viz. of Hereford and Salop. The diocese is valued in the King's books at L.768: 10:6\frac{1}{2}. and is computed to be worth annually £.3000. The tenths of the clergy amount to £.340:2:2.

To this cathedral belong a Bishop, a Dean, a Treasurer, a Chancellor, 2 Archdeacons, 16 Canons, 24 Prebendaties, a Chanter, and other inferior officers and servants.

# LANDAFF.

This is a very ancient see, by whom founded is uncertain; it was one of the suffragans of St David's, and the first Bishop, that is known for certainty, is St Dubritius. This see was formerly very wealthy; but its revenues have been greatly diminished, particularly by Anthony Dunstan, its 63d Bishop. The church is dedicated to St Thelian, its 2d Bishop; but Dugdale says St Peter, and takes its name from its situation; Lan, in Welch, signifying a church; and the church is founded close upon the river Taffi in Glamorganshire. This bishoprick contains about three fourths of Glamorganshire, and all Monmouthshire, except seven parishes; comprehending 177 parishes, whereof 98 are impropriations: Here is only one Archdeacon, viz. of Landaff. This see is valued in the King's books at L.154:14:1, and is computed to be worth annually L.1600. The clergy's tenths is about L.155:5:4.

### LINCOLN.

This diocese was formerly two sees, viz. Sidnacester, (not far from Gainsborough, in Lincolnshire), and Dorchester, in Oxfordshire. The former was united to Dorchester, after remaining a long time vacant, after the death of Eadulf II. its ninth bishop; and both were, about

about the year 1057, removed to Lincoln by Bishop Remigus de Fescamp, who built a cathedral there, which was afterwards destroyed by fire, but rebuilt by Alexander the 23d Bishop, and made the beautiful pile it now appears, by Hugh of Burgundy the 25th Bishop. It is dedicated to the Virgin Mary and All Saints. This diocese is the largest in the whole kingdom, notwithstanding the dioceses of Ely, Oxford, and Peterborough, were formerly parts of this see. At present it contains all Lincoln, Leicester, Huntingdon, Bedford, and Buckingham shires, and a part of Hertfordshire; in which are 1255 parishes, whereof 577 are impropriations. It hath six Archdeacon-ries, viz. Lincoln, Leicester, Bedford, Buckingham, Stow, and Huntingdon. The revenues of this Bishoprick were valued, at the dissolution of monasteries, at L.2065: 12: 5. and the common revenues of the Chapter at L. 578:8:2. But many of its manors being seized upon, it is now only rated in the King's books at L.894: 10: 1; but is computed to be worth yearly L.3200. The clergy's tenth is valued at L.1751. 14s. 6d.

This see hath given to the Church of Rome three Saints, and one Cardinal, and to the realm of England six Lord Chancellors, one Lord Treasurer, one Lord Keeper, four Chancellors to the University of Oxford, and two to Cambridge. The Bishops of Lincoln were heretofore accounted Chancellors to the Archbishop of Camterbury.

There belong to this Cathedral a Bishop, a Dean, a Precentor, a Chancellor, a Sub-dean, six Archdeacons, fifty-two Prebendaries, four Priests-Vicars, eight Lay-clerks, or Singing-men, an Organist, seven Poor Clerks, eight Choristers, and seven Burghurst Chanters.

LONDON.

#### LONDON.

This see was Archiepiscopal in the time of the Britons, and was designed by Pope Gregory to have continued so amongst the English; but St Augustine, whom his Holiness sent to convert the Saxons, was so pleased with his reception from Ethelbert King of Kent, that he set up his staff at Canterbury, the capital of Ethelbert's dominions, which has continued the metropolitan see of England ever since .-London was still continued a Bishoprick; and its cathedral church was built by Ethelbert, but afterwards much improved by Bishop Erkenwald. It has repeatedly been destroyed by fire; the last time in 1666; since which it has been built anew at the public expence, under the direction of that celebrated artist Sir Christopher Wren, and dedicated to St Paul. The Bishop of this see hath precedency before all Bishops of the realm, next to the two Archbishops, and is Dean to the Archbishop of Canterbury, an office of great dignity and trust. This see hath yielded to the church of Rome five saints, and to the English nation nine Lord Chancellors, seven Lord Treasurers, one Chancellor of the Exchequer, and two Chancellors to the University of Oxford. This diocese hath five Archdeacons, viz. London, Middlesex, Essex, Colchester, and St Alban's, and is valued in the King's books at L.1119: 8: 4. and is computed to be worth yearly L.6200. The clergy's tenths amount to L.821: 15: 1. The diocese contains the counties of Middlesex and Essex, and a part of Hertfordshire, wherein are reckoned' 622 parishes, of which there are 180 impropriate.

To the cathedral of St Paul's belong a Bishop, a Dean, five Archdeacons, a Treasurer, a Chancellor, two Canons Residentiary, twenty Prebendaries, a Precentor, and other inferior officers and servants.

#### NORWICH.

This see was once two distinct bishopricks, viz. of Elmham, in Norfolk, and of Dunwich, in Suffolk. Felix, a Burgundian, who first converted the East Angles, founded a see; Bifus, the third Bishop in succession from him, finding himself from his great age unable to bear so great a burden, got his diocese divided into two, as abovementioned. Both sees suffered extremely from the Danish invasions, insomuch, that after the death of St Humbert both sees lay vacant for upwards of an hundred years. At last the see of Elmham was revived, and the see of Dunwich was united to it; but Herfast, the 22d Bishop, removed the seat of the see to Thetford, in Norfolk, where it continued till Herbert Losinga, the 24th Bishop, removed the see to Norwich, where it has continued ever since. The value of this bishoprick is greatly diminished since the Reformation, as King Henry VIII. seized all lands belonging to this see, and gave them only what lands belonged to the monastery of St Bennet's in the Holm, in lieu thereof. The cathedral of Norwich was first built by Herbert Losinga, and dedicated to the Holy Trinity; but as most of the structures in those times were chiefly composed of wood, it several times suffered from fire; but at last it was completed, in the manner we now see it, by Middleton, the 36th Bishop. This see hath given to the church of Rome two saints; and to the nation five Lord Chancellors, one Lord Treasurer, one Lord Chief Justice, one Bishop Almoner, and one Principal Secretary of State.

This diocese contains the entire counties of Norfolk \* and Suffolk, except one parish in the former, and four in the latter; and has, besides, sixteen churches and chapels in Cambridgeshire, containing 1121 parishes, whereof 385 are impropriate; it hath four Archdeacons, viz. Norwich, Norfolk, Suffolk, and Sudbury. It is valued in the King's books at L.899: 18: 71, and is computed to be worth annually L.3000. The clergy's tenth amounts to L.1117: 13: 01.

To this cathedral belong a Bishop, a Dean, a Treasurer, a Chancellor, four Archdeacons, six Prebendaries, and other officers and servants.

#### OXFORD.

This diocese constituted a part of the diocese of Lincoln until r 54r. when King Henry VIII. erected this into a Bishoprick, and endowed it out of the land of the dissolved monasteries of Abingdon and Osney; and the same King assigned the church of the abbey of Osney for a cathedral to this see; but five years afterwards he removed the seat of the see to Oxford. The present cathedral of Oxford was anciently dedicated to St Frideswide; but when the see was translated thither, it was entitled Christ Church, and part of the lands appropriated by Cardinal Wolsey to the maintenance of his college, was allotted to the Dean and chapter; but during the reign of Queen Elizabeth, this see was almost stripped of the ample endowments it received from her father. This diocese contains the county of Oxford, and therein are 190 parishes, of which 88 are impropriate. It hath but one Archdeacon, viz. of Oxford. This see is valued in the King's books at L.354: 16: 43d. and is computed to be worth annually L.2800. The clergy's tenth amounts to L.255: 8: 0.

To this cathedral, as constituted by King Henry VIII. there belong a Bishop, a Dean, a Chancellor, an Archdeacon, a Treasurer, eight Canons, and other inferior officers and servants.

#### PETERBOROUGH.

This diocese is another of those erected by King Henry VIII. and endowed out of the lands of the dissolved monasteries; and was wholly taken from the diocese of Lincoln. This place was anciently called Medeshamstede; but Wolpher, King of the Mercians, founding an abbey here, and dedicating it to St Peter, it came to be called Peterborough. The church was afterwards destroyed by the Danes; but it was rebuilt with great beauty, and continued to flourish till the Reformation. This diocese contains the two counties of Northampton (in which Peterborough is situated) and Rutland, except three parishes in each, in which are 203 parishes, whereof of are impropriatc. It hath only one Archdeacon, viz. of Northampton. The see is valued in the King's books at L.414: 19: 11. and is computed to be worth annually L.1700; the tenth of the clergy amounting to L.520: 16: 8.

To this cathedral belong (as constituted by King Henry VIII.) a Bishop, a Dean, an Archdeacon, six Prebendaries, a Treasurer, a Chancellor, eight Petty-canons, four Students in Divinity, an Epistler, a Gospeller, a Sub-dean, Sub-Treasurer, a Chanter, and other officers and servants.

ROCHESTER.

#### ROCHESTER.

This see is the smallest, and, next to Canterbury, the most ancient in England, it being founded by St Augustine about ten years after he came first to England. The cathedral church was first erected by Ethelbert, King of Kent, when it was made a Bishop's see, and dedicated to St Andrew. This fabric growing ruinous, was afterwards rebuilt by Gondulph, one of its Bishops, in 1080. The Bishop here is styled Chaplain to the Archbishop of Canterbury; and the Archbishop claimed, and, for several centuries, disposed of this Bishoprick. Their patronage was often disputed by the Prior and Monks here, who at last obtained a Papal decree in their favour. In all solemn pomps and processions, the Bishop of Rochester was cross-bearer to the Archbishop of Canterbury. The revenue of this see is now so small, that for many years the Deanery of Westminster has been held in commendam with it, for its better support. This diocese contains only a small part of the county of Kent, together with the parish of Iselham, in Cambridgeshire, and Freckenham, in the county of Suffolk, making in all about 98 parishes, whereof 36 are impropriate. Here is one Archdeacon, viz. of Rochester. This see is valued in the King's books at L.358: 3:  $2\frac{1}{4}$ , and is computed to be worth annually L.2400, including the Deanery of Westminster. The clergy's tenth is the least of any English see, being no more than L.222: 14: 64. This little see hath yielded to the church of Rome one Cardinal, to the English nation one Lord Chancellor, one Lord Keeper of the Great Seal, and one Lord Treasurer.

To this Cathedral belong a Bishop, a Dean, an Archdeacon, a Chancellor, a Treasurer, six Prebendaries, a Chanter, and other inferior officers and servants.

### SALISBURY.

This see hath undergone many alterations, from the time it was first established, to its final settlement at Salisbury. Its first seat was at Sherborn, in Dorsetshire; and the diocese then had Episcopal jurisdiction

diction over all those counties which now constitute the dioceses of Salisbury, Bristol, Wells, and Exeter. But Wells and Exeter were dismembered from it, and erected into two distinct Bishopricks in anno 905; and, a few years afterwards, another see was formed out of the remaining jurisdiction of Sherborn, and seated at Wilton, in Wilt-But this last see, after having had eleven Bishops of its own, was once more united to Sherborn. And, soon after, the seat of the see was removed to Salisbury, the principal city in those parts; but the then Bishop removed it from thence to the hill called Old Sarum, and began to build a Cathedral Church there, which was finished by St Osmund. This situation was chosen, perhaps, from the strong fortifications with which the hill was surrounded, and so out of the reach of the merciless invaders, the Danes. Bishop Richard Poore once more brought the seat of the see from the hill of Old Sarum to Salisbury, or New Sarum, where it has continued ever since. He first began the Cathedral Church there, which was finished in the year 1258 by Bishop Bridport, and dedicated to the Virgin Mary. In ancient times, the Bishops of Salisbury were Precentors to the Archbishop of Canterbury; and King Edward IV. annexed the Chancellorship of the Garter to the Bishops of this sec; but, in the new statutes made by King Henry VIII. this office was left solely at the King's disposal, or to a clergyman or layman; but, since Bishop Ward's time, it hath continued, without interruption, to be conferred on the Bishops of Salisbury.

This see hath yielded to the Church of Rome one Saint, and two Cardinals; and to the English nation one Lord Chief Justice, three Lord Chancellors, two Lord Treasurers, two Masters of the Rolls, two Chancellors to the University of Oxford, and one to Cambridge.

This diocese contains all Wiltshire, except two parishes;—all Berkshire, except one parish, and part of another;—and it hath likewise several parishes in Dorsetshire, (in the diocese of Bristol), its own peculiars; making in all about 544 parishes, of which 109 are impropriations. It hath three Archdeacons, viz. of Salisbury, Wiltshire, and Berkshire; and is valued in the King's books at L.1367: II: 8; and is computed to be worth annually L.3500.—The clergy's tenth amounts to L.001: 8:0.

To this Cathedral belong a Bishop, a Dean, a Precentor, a Chancellor, three Archdeacons, a Sub-dean, a Sub-chanter, forty-five Prebendaries, six Vicars or Petty Canons, six Singing Men, eight Choristers, an Organist, and other officers.

### WINCHESTER.

This see is of great antiquity, and has always continued in this place, which was the capital of the West Saxon kingdom. The cathedral church was first founded and endowed by Kingil, or Kenegilsus, the first Christian King of the West Saxons, who gave unto it all the lands within seven miles of this church. His son Kinelwalchin.

trod in his father's footsteps in liberality to this see; for he not only ratified his father's donation, but added it to the manors of Alresford. Dowation, and Worthy. The church first built becoming ruinous, the present fabric was begun by Walkin the 34th Bishop, but not finished till the time of William of Wickham, who made great additions to it. The church was first dedicated to St Amphibalus; then to St Peter; after to St Swithin, one Bishop here; and last of all to the blessed Trinity, as it still remains. The Bishop here is accounted Subdean to the Archbishop of Canterbury; and, by King Edward III. had the office of Prelate of the order of St George, or the Garter, conferred upon them, and which hath continued to them ever since. They were anciently reputed to be Earls of Southampton; and are so styled in the new statutes of the Garter made by King Henry VIII; but that title does not now belong to them. The Bishops here had great privileges, and very large possessions, insomuch that Henry de Blois (brother to King Stephen), when Bishop here, procured the Pope's consent to make Winchester an Archbishop's see; and seven of the Suffragans of Canterbury were to have been given to it; but, by some means, this scheme was never put in execution. William de Edington, the 50th Bishop here, was elected Archbishop of Canterbury; but he refused to accept, saying, 'Though Canterbury bad the highest rack, yet Winchester had the deepest manger.' Since the Reformation, the power and great wealth of this see have been much diminished; and its valuation in the King's books at present is less by L. 1000 a-year than it was at that time.

This see hath given to the Church of Rome ten Saints and two Cardinals, and to the English nation one Lord Chief Justice, nine Lord Chancellors, two Lord Treasurers, one Lord Privy Seal, one Chancellor of the Exchequer, and one Chancellor of the University of Oxford.

This diocese contains the whole county of Southampton, the county of Surrey, excepting eleven peculiars of the Archbishop of Canterbury; one parish in Wiltshire; together with the islands of Jersey, of 12 parishes; Guernsey, of ten parishes; Alderney and Sark, of one parish each; making in all 384 parishes, of which 131 are impropriations. It has two Archdeacons, and is valued in the King's books at L.2793: 4:2; and is computed to be worth annually L.7400; out of which must be deducted indispensible, for pensions, to the amount of L.1300. The clergy's tenth amount to L.846:12:0.

To this Cathedral belong a Bishop, a Dean, two Archdeacons, a Chancellor, a Treasurer, twelve Prebendaries, and other inferior officers and servants.

#### WORCESTER.

This see was founded by Etheldred, King of the Mercians, in the year 679, and taken from the see of Litchfield, of which it composed a part; he likewise built the cathedral church, and well endowed the same. This fabric, which was dedicated to St Peter, becoming ruinous, Oswald, the 18th Bishop, began to repair it, and his successors finished it; likewise displaced the married priests, and settled monks in their stead in 964; but his foundation was destroyed by the Danes, and the church, which now stands, was begun by Wolstan II. the 25th Bishop of this see, about the year 1030, and dedicated to the Virgin Mary. The Bishops of Worcester, in ancient times, were the peculiar Chaplains of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and by their office said mass in all assemblies of the clergy where he was present.

This see hath yielded to the church of Rome four Saints, and to the English nation five Lord Chancellors, three Lord Treasurers, one Chancellor to the Queen, one Lord President of Wales, and one Vice-President; and to the Dutchy of Normandy one Chancellor.

This diocese contains all Worcestershire, excepting 21 churches and chapels which belong to the sec of Hereford; about a third part of Warwickshire, two parishes in Staffordshire, one parish in Shropshire, and two chapelries in Gloucestershire, making in all 241 parishes, whereof 71 parishes are impropriations. This see hath only one Archdeacon, viz. of Worcester; the see is valued in the King's books at L.1049: 16:3\frac{3}{4}, and is computed to be worth annually L.3400. The clergy's tenth is L.228.

To this cathedral belong a Bishop, a Dean, an Archdeacon, a Treasurer, a Chancellor, ten Prebendaries, ten Minor-canons, ten Lay-clerks, ten Choristers, forty Scholars, two Schoolmasters, and other officers and servants.

#### WESTMINSTER.

Westminster, so called from its standing west from the cathedral church of St Paul's, for its ancient name was Thorney; and, in the time of the Britons, its church was the cathedral of the Archbishop of London; but the Archiepiscopal see being destroyed by the Saxons, Segbert, King of Essex, erected a church here, and dedicated it of St Peter. This church becoming ruinous, it was rebuilt by King Edward the Confessor, who stored it with Monks from Exeter. And the church once more becoming ruinous in the reign of King Henry III. that monarch rebuilt it in a most beautiful style. King Henry VII. added a royal mansoleum, and most superb chapel, (which goes by its name), at the west end.

The Abbots had Archiepiscopal jurisdiction within their liberties, and had the keeping of the regalia, and a chief service in the coronation of the Kings of England, and a seat in Parliament; in all which rights, save this last mentioned one, the Deans have succeeded to the Abbots. At the dissolution of monasteries, this Abbey was valued at L.3977; and King Henry VIII. in 1539, erected it into a Deanery; and in 1541, he erected it into a Bishoprick, and appointed John Thirleby Bishop thereof. But he having wasted the patrimony allotted by the King for the support of the see, he was translated to Norwich; and with him ended the Bishoprick of Westminster; this dignity continuing only nine years; and Middlesex, which was the dioccse, was restored to London. The Dean continued to preside, until the accession of Queen Mary, who restored the Abbot; but Queen Elizabeth displaced the Abbot, and erected it into a collegiate church, of a Dean, and twelve Prebendaries, as it still continues. On the revival of the honourable Order of the Bath in 1725, the Dean of Westminster was appointed Dean of that order; and this honour has been continued to his successors.

## YORK.

York is certainly the most ancient metropolitan see at this time in England, being so made by King Lucius about the year 180, when Christianity was first established in England. But this establishment was overturned, by the Saxons driving out the Britons; and when the Saxons were converted, Pope Gregory determined that the same dignity should be restored to York; and Paulinus was made Archbishop of this see about the year 622. The Pope designed that York should have as many suffragan Bishops as London, (for there the Pope designed the southern metropolitan see should be placed). But, if ever this order took effect, the suffragan bishopricks of York had been small, and of little importance, and had been found inadequate to support their dignity, and joined either to York or Durham, as these were the only two sees in the north of England for a very long space of time, till King Henry I. erected a bishoprick at Carlisle, and King Henry VIII. another at Chester. York claimed to be the metropolitan of the Scottish Bishops; and from him they received consecration, and swore canonical obedience to this see. But during the time of Archbishop George Nevil, the Scottish Bishops withdrew from their obedience, and had Archbishops of their own. Much dispute arose between the two English metropolitans about precedency over the other, as by Pope Gregory's institutions, it was thought he meant that which of them was first confirmed should have the precedence. Appeal was made to the Court of Rome by both parties; at last it was determined in favour of Canterbury; but the Archbishop of York was allowed to style himself Primate of England, while the Archbishop of Canterbury styles himself Primate of all England .-The Archbishop of York hath precedence before all Dukes not of the blood-royal; as also before all the great officers of state, the Lord High Chancellor excepted.

The cathedral church here was first built, or rather begun, by Edwyn, King of Northumberland, in 672, and finished by his successor King Oswald, and dedicated to St Peter. But this establishment being ruined by the Danes, another church was built soon after the Conquest by Archbishop Thomas, the 25th Bishop of this see, and completed and beautified, as we now see it, by his successors. This see hath yielded to the church of Rome eight Saints and three Cardinals, and to the English nation twelve Lord Chancellors, two Lord Treasurers, and two Lord Presidents of the North.

This diocese contains above three-fourths of Yorkshire, all Nottinghamshire, and Hexham, in the county of Northumberland, in which are 581 parishes, whereof 336 are impropriations. Here are four Archdeacons, viz. of York, Cleveland, East Riding, and Nottingham. This bishoprick was at first stated in the King's books at L.2035: 14:6; but since King Henry VIII. made free with its lands, it has been rated at only L.1609: 19:2; but it is computed to be worth annually L.7000. The clergy's tenth amounts to L.113: 17:9\frac{1}{2}.

CARLISLE.

#### CARLISLE.

This see was erected in 1133 by King Henry I. and made suffragan to the Archbishop of York. The cathedral church here had been founded a short time before by Walter, deputy in these parts for King William Rufus, and by him dedicated to the Virgin Mary. He likewise built a monastery, and filled it with Canons Regular of St Augustine. This foundation continued till the dissolution of monasteries, when its lands were added to the see, and the maintenance of a Dean, &c. placed here in their room. The church here was almost ruined by the usurper Cromwell, and his soldiers; and has never since recovered its former beauty, although repaired after the Restoration. This diocese contains the greatest part of the counties of Cumberland and Westmoreland, in which are only 93 parishes; but these (as all the northern are) exceeding large; and of them 18 are impropriations. Here is one Archdeacon, viz. of Carlisle. This see is valued in the King's books at L.530: 4: 113, but is computed to be worth annually L.2800. The clergy's tenth amounts only to L.161: 1; 71.

This see hath given to the English nation one Lord Chancellor, two Lord Treasurers, and three Chancellors to the University of Cambridge.

To this cathedral belong a Bishop, a Dean, a Chancellor, an Archdeacon, four Prebendaries, eight Minor Canons, &c. and other inferior officers and servauts.

#### CHESTER.

The Bishoprick of Chester was anciently part of the diocese of Litchfield; one of whose Bishops removing the seat of his see hither in the year 1075, occasioned his successors to be frequently styled Bishops of Chester. But it was not erected into a distinct Bishoprick until until the general dissolution of monasteries, when King Henry VIII. in the year 1541, raised it to this dignity, and allotted the church of the Abbey of St Werburg for the cathedral, styling it the cathedral church of Christ and the blessed Virgin; adding the bishoprick to the province of Canterbury; but, soon after, he disjoined it from Canterbury, and added it to the province of York. When this abbey was dissolved, its revenues were valued at L.1003: 5:11.

This diocese contains the entire counties of Chester and Lancaster, part of the counties of Westmoreland, Cumberland, and Yorkshire, two chapelries in Denbigshire, and five parishes in Flintshire; amounting in all to 256 parishes, of which 101 are impropriations.—This bishoprick is valued in the King's books at L.420:1:8, and is computed to be worth annually L.2700; the clergy's tenth amounting to L.435: 12:0.

#### DURHAM.

The seat of this see was first fixed at Landisfarne, or Holy Island, a small island on the coast of Northumberland; but from this spot they were forced by the rude and merciless invasions of the Danes. They next fixed at Chester on the street, where they remained near 200 years, and then settled finally at Durham, having, during their peregrination

grination from Landisfarne, carried the bones of St Cuthbert, the sixth Bishop, about with them; and when the cathedral of Durham was founded, they were, with all due respect for so pious a man, depo-sited there. To him the church was dedicated. And, so great was the fame of this saint, that he not only gave name to the church, but to all the country now known by the name of the country or the bishoprick of Durham; it being anciently called St Cuthbert's patrimony; and King Alfred conferred upon the Bishops here all the county between the rivers Tees and Tyne. And this donation, great of itself, was not only confirmed by his successors, but augmented. The Bishops here had very great power and authority. King Henry VIII. curtailed many of their privileges; some of which were afterwards restored by his daughter Queen Mary. His power is still very considerable; for he is Count Palatine of the bishoprick or county of Durham; and, in right of his see, Earl of Sadberg; and, in point of precedence, takes place next the Bishop of London. It is deemed the richest bishoprick in the kingdom; and the Prebends are frequently styled the Golden Prebends of Durham:

The beautiful cathedral at present here, was begun soon after the Norman conquest, by William, the 30th Bishop, and finished by his successors.

This diocese contains the whole counties of Durham and Northumberland, except the jurisdiction of Hexham, in the latter. It hath also one parish in the county of Cumberland; making in the whole 135 parishes, whereof 87 are impropriate. The see is valued in the King's books at L.2821: 1:54, but is computed to be worth annually L.8700. The clergy's tenths amount to L.385: 5:64.

It has two Archdeacons, viz. of Durham and Northumberland.— This see hath given to the church of Rome eight Saints and one Cardinal, and to the English nation one Lord Chief Justice, five Lord Chancellors, three Lord Treasurers, one Principal Secretary of State, one Chancellor to the University of Oxford, and two Masters of the Rolls.

To the cathedral belong a Bishop, a Dean, a Chancellor, a Treasurer, two Archdeacons, twelve Prebendarics, and many other infetion officers and servants.

#### HEXHAM.

This Bishoprick was founded in the infancy of the Saxon church. Ten Bishops enjoyed it successively; and then, by reason of the spoil and rapine of the Danes, it discontinued, and the jurisdiction was given to the see of York. From this time forward Hexham has been held to be a see of that Archbishoprick, and had the reputation of a County Palatine; but by act of Parliament, 37th of King Henry

VIII. it was taken from that see, and united with the county of Northumberland.

#### MAN.

This bishoprick was first erected by Pope Gregory IV. and for its diocese had this isle and all the Hebrides or Western Islands of Scotland; but which were called Sodoroc by the Danes, who went to them by the north, from the Swedish Sodor, Sail or Oar Islands, from which the title of the Bishop of Sodor is supposed to originate. See a more particular account in the 2d vol. of this work, when the Scots Bishops of the Isles is spoken of. The Bishop's seat was at Rushin, or Castletown, in the Isle of Man, and in Latin is entitled Sodorensis. But when this island became dependent upon the kingdom of England, the Western Islands withdrew themselves from the obedience of their Bishop, and had a Bishop of their own, whom they entitled also Sodorensis, but commonly Bishop of the Isles. The patronage of the bishoprick was given, together with the island, to the Stanleys, by King Edward IV. (and came by an heir-female to the late Duke of Athole, whose only daughter, the present Duchess of Athole, is Lady of the Isle of Man), who still keeps it; and, on a vacancy thereof, they nominate their designed Bishop to the King,

who dismisses him to the Archbishop of York for consecration. The above is a good reason why the Bishop is not a Lord of Parliament, as none can have suffrage in that house who does not hold immediately of the King himself. By an act of Parliament, the 33d of King Henry VIII. this bishoprick is declared in the province of York. The diocese contains only 17 parishes, of which 5 are market towns, the rest villages.

### OF BARONETS.

BARONETS are the first among the gentry, and the only Knighthood that is hereditary. This honour was first instituted by King James I. in 1611, who limited the number to two hundred; but his successors have not adhered to this rule, as their number is greatly increased. The rebellion of the Irish, in the Province of Ulster, seems to have given rise to this order, as a Baronet on his creation must pay into the Exchequer as much as will maintain thirty soldiers three years, at eightpence a day, in the Province of Ulster in Ireland, which amounts to near L.1100 Sterling; so that, including fees, the expence of this dignity may be about L.1200. To be qualified for it, one must be a gentleman born, and have a clear estate of L1000 per annum. They have precedence before all Knights, except Knights of the Garter, Knights who are Privy Counseilors, or Knights Bannerets, made under the King's banner or standard.

They have the privilege to bear in a canton of their coat of arms, or in a whole escutcheon, the arms of Ulster, viz. in a Field, Argent, a sinister hand, Gules-

The title Sir is granted to Baronets by a particular clause in their patents; and their wives are Ladies.

The first Baronet who was created was Sir Nicholas Bacon of Redgrave in Suffolk, whose successor is therefore styled *Primus Baronet*torum Angliae.

## THE GREAT OFFICERS OF STATE.

#### LORD HIGH STEWARD OF ENGLAND.

THE first Great Officer of the Crown was formerly the Lord Steward of England, or Viceroy, for so the word signifies in the Saxon; and he is styled in Latin Magnus Anglia Seneschallus. This honourable office is of great antiquity, it being established prior to the reign of Edward the Confessor. He was the prime officer under the King, and the office was formerly annexed to the Lordship of Hinkley, in Leicestershire; and this Lordship belonging to the family of Montfort, Earls of Leicester, they were, in right thereof, Lord High Stewards of England: But Simon de Montfort, the last Earl of this family, making a bad use of the great power which this office gave him, raised a rebellion against his sovereign King Henry III. and was attainted, and his estate forfeited to the King. That prince and his successors, wisely judging that the power was too great and exorbitant, in a great measure abolished the office, as, in the hands of an enterprising and ambitious subject, it might be made subservient to the worst of purposes. It is therefore now revived only pro bac vice, to officiate at a coronation, or the trial of a peer. By his commission to the first, he sits judicially himself, or appoints commissioners to act for him. He keeps his court in the King's palace, where he receiveth the petitions of all noblemen and others, who, by tenure or otherwise, claim to do service at the coronation of the King, for which he receives certain fees and allowances, due by custom; and at the coronation he carries St Edward's Crown.

When he is appointed to preside at the trial of some Peer or Peeress of the realm for treason or felony, or some other great crime, he is attended from his house to the house of Lords, by the Judges and Officers at Arms, in great state; where, the Peers being assembled, his commission is read, and a white rod, his emblem of office, is put into his hand with great ceremony; and then his Grace, for so he is then styled, takes the scat allotted for him as Lord High Steward, and proceeds to the trial of the person or persons arraigned before him. When the trial is over, his Grace breaks the rod, which ends his commission.

#### LORD HIGH CHANCELLOR.

The second Great Officer of the Crown is the Lord High Chancellor, or Lord Keeper of the Great Seal. Formerly this office was conferred upon some dignified clergyman, remarkable for his abilities and knowledge of the Civil Law. After the Princes of the Blood Royal, he is the first lay-subject, and is reputed the Keeper of the King's conscience.

He is an officer of very great power, as no patents, writs, or grants, are valid, until he affixes the Great Seal thereto. His oath is as follows:

- 1. That he will well and truly serve our Sovereign Lord the King, and his people, in the office of Chancellor (or Lord Keeper.)
- 2. That he shall do right to all manner of people, poor and rich, after the laws and usages of the realm.
- 3. That he shall truly counsel the King, and his counsel he shall layne and keep.
- 4. That he shall not know nor suffer the hurt, or disinheriting of the King, or that the rights of the Crown be decreased by any means, as far as he may let it.
- 5. And if he may let it, he shall make it clearly and expressly to be known to the King, with his true advice and counsel.
- 6. And that he shall do and purchase the King's profit in all that he reasonably may.

Amongst the many great prerogatives of his office, he has a power to judge according to Equity, Conscience, and Reason, where he finds the law of the land so defective as the subject would-be injured thereby. If a man be imprisoned illegally during the vacation, he has power to grant a Habeas Corpus, and do him justice according to law; whereas, neither the Court of King's Bench, nor the Common Pleas, can grant that writ but in term-time.

He may hold pleas of Scire Facias, to repeal letters patent:—1st, Where several are granted of the same thing to more than one person; 2d, Where the King granteth any thing that is upon false suggestion, or not to be granted.

He has power to collate to all ecclesiastical benefices in his Majesty's gift, rated under L.20 a-year in the King's books.

The Lord Chancellor and Lord Keeper are the same in authority, power, and precedence; they are appointed by the King's delivery of the Great Seal to them, and by taking the oath of office. They differ only in this point, that the Lord Chancellor hath also letters patent; whereas the Lord Keeper has none.

#### LORD HIGH TREASURER OF ENGLAND.

The Lord High Treasurer is the third Great Officer of the Crown. He is appointed not only by his Majesty's delivering unto him a white staff, but also by letters-patent. When the letters-patent have passed the Great Seal, he goes in state to the Court of Chancery; and on his knees before the Lord High Chancellor, or Lord Keeper, (or such such as are by letters-patent constituted to supply that office,) he takes the oath.

- 1. That well and truly he shall serve the King and his people, in the office of Treasurer.
- That he shall do right to all manner of people, poor and rich, in such things as concern his office.
  - 3. The King's Treasures he shall surely keep and dispend.
  - 4. He shall truly counsel the King.
  - 5. The King's counsel he shall layne and keep.
- 6. That he shall neither know, nor suffer the King's hurt, nor his disheriting, nor the rights of the Crown to be decreased by any means, as far forth as he may let it.
- 7. And if he may not let it, he shall make knowledge thereof, clearly and expressly, to the King, with his true advice and counsel.
- 8. That he shall do and purchase the King's profit in all that he reasonably may do.

After he has taken the above oath, he repairs to the Court of Exchequer, at the bar of which Court the aforesaid letters-patent are read: he then takes his place in that Court, which now is only honorary, he never sitting among the Barons as formerly (with the Chamberlains) judicially.

He is a Lord by his office, and governeth the upper Court of Exchequer; has the custody of the King's treasure, and of foreign and domestic records there deposited. He has the appointment of all Commissioners and other officers employed in collecting the revenues of the Crown. He has the nomination of all escheators, and disposal of all places anywise relating to the revenue, and of the kingdom; and power to let leases of the Crown lands. His place he holds during pleasure, and is accounted of great value, as well as power.

This great office is now executed by five persons, who are called Lord Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Treasurer, viz. the first Lord of the Treasury has a salary of L. 1000 per annum, and the other four have L. 1600 a-year each. Under these are two joint Secretaries, feur Chief Clerks, two Solicitors, and many other inferior officers.

The office of Chancellor of the Exchequer is always held by one of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, (except upon some very particular occasions, when the Lord Chief Justice of the King's Ecoch is appointed to act as such.) He is styled Chancellor and Under Treasurer of the Exchequer; he has the custody of the Exchequer Seal: he has also the comptrolment of the rolls of the Lords of the Treasury; and sits in the Court of Exchequer above the Barons of Exchequer. He has many lucrative offices in the Court of Exchequer in his gift.

#### LORD PRESIDENT OF THE COUNCIL.

The Lord President of the Council is the fourth Great Officer of State, and presides at the Privy Council, which great and honourable assembly commonly meets at the Cockpit, Whitehall, or at the Palace of St James's, in order to consult upon those measures that are most likely

likely to contribute to the honour, defence, safety, and benefit of his Majesty's dominions. The numbers of the Privy Council are unlimited. They are selected by his Majesty; and ought to be distinguished by their wisdom, courage, integrity, and political knowledge. A Privy Counsellor, though but a private gentleman, is styled Right Honourable, has precedence of all Knights, Baronets, and the younger sons of all Barons and Viscounts. They sit at the council-board bare-headed when his Majesty presides; they are admitted members of the Most Honourable Privy Council by summons only, and taking the oath prescribed by law, where they take their seats according to their rank; and at all debates the lowest delivers his opinion first; and the King last of all declares his judgement, which closes the matter of debate. His Majesty in Council has great power; he can with their advice dissolve the Parliament, or prorogue it, or call a new one; he has power, in certain urgent cases, to publish proclamations, under such penalties and pains as to him and them shall appear requisite; and those must be observed, as if done by act of Parliament. It is the business of the Privy Council to enquire into all crimes and trespasses against the state, and to commit the delinquents in order for trial. By law it is felony to strike a Privy Counsellor in the execution of his office.

The President of the Council is appointed to this important office by letters-patent, under the Great Seal, durante bene placito, and, by his office, is to attend the King's royal person, and to manage the debates in Council; to propose matters from the King at the Council-table; and to report to his Majesty the resolutions taken thereupon.

## LORD PRIVY SEAL.

The Lord Privy Seal is a place of great trust, honour, and antiquity. He is the fifth Great Officer of State, and is denominated from his having the custody of the Privy Seal, which he must not put to any grant, without good warrant under the King's signet, nor warrant, if contrary to law and custom, or inconvenient, without first acquainting his Majesty therewith. This seal is used by the King to all charters, grants, and pardons, signed by the King before they come to the Great Seal. But a warrant may be granted by the King, under the Privy Seal, to issue money out of the Exchequer, and is sufficient, because a chattel in possession: And also the same may be affixed to other things that never pass the Great Seal, as, to cancel a recognisance made to the King, or to discharge a debt. But no writs can pass this Seal, which touch the common law. He is appointed

by letters-patent; he is a Privy Counsellor by his office; takes place next after the Lord President of the Council, and before all Dukes; and Chief Judge of the Court of Requests, when it shall be revived. He is admitted into office by taking the oath of office prescribed by law.

#### LORD GREAT CHAMBERLAIN OF ENGLAND.

The Lord Great Chamberlain of England is the sixth Great Officer of State. The office is of very great antiquity, and was formerly of very great importance. To him belong livery and lodging in the King's Court; and certain fees are his due from every Archbishop and Bishop, when they do their homage or fealty to the King, and from all Peers, on their creation, or doing homage or fealty. At the Coronation he is to have forty ells of crimson velvet for his own robes; and on the Coronation-day, before the King rises, his duty is to carry to him his shirt and wearing apparel; and when his Majesty is dressed and gone out of his bedchamber, he is to have his bed, and all the furniture of his bedchamber, where he lay the night before, with his wearing apparel and night-gown, for his fee; also to serve the King with water before and after dinner, and to have the bason and towels for his fee.

He is to provide all things for the House of Lords in time of Parliament. The fitting up of Westminster Hall for a Coronation, or the trial of a Peer or Peeress, or any public solemnity, belongs likewise to his office.

This high office appertained for many centuries to the noble family of De Vere, Earl of Oxford, having been granted to them by King Henry I, until the death of John de Vere, the 16th Earl of Oxford, without heirs-male. Mary, his sole-daughter and heiress, marrying Peregrine Bertie, Lord Willoughby of Eresby, was mother by him to Robert Bertie, Lord Willoughby of Eresby, who made claim to the Earldom of Oxford, as also to the titles of Lord Bolbeck, (of Bolbeck-castle, in the parish of Whitchurch, near Aylesbury, in the county of Buckiugham,) Sandford, and Badlesmere, and to the office of Lord Great Chamberlain of England. After much dispute, the House of Lords gave judgment, that he had made good his claim to the office of Lord Great Chamberlain of England, but not to the titles of Oxford, &c.; and he was admitted into the House of Lords with his staff, Nov. 22. the second of King Charles I. And his descendants uninterruptedly enjoyed the same till the death of Robert Bertie, fourth Duke of Ancaster and Kesteven, Marquis and Earl of Lindsey.

Lindsey, and Lord Willoughby of Eresby, Lord Great Chamberlain, in July 1779; who dying unmarried, was succeeded, as Duke of Ancaster and Kesteven, Marquis and Earl of Lindsey, by his uncle the Lord Brownlow Bertie, now Duke of Ancaster; but for the Great Chamberlainship there were several claimants, viz. his Grace Brown-low, the present Duke of Ancaster; Hugh, Earl Percy, eldest son to the Duke of Northumberland; Charlotte, Duchess Dowager of Athol, in her own right Lady Baroness Strange of Knockyn; and the Lady Priscilla Barbara Elizabeth Burrel, in her own right Baroness Willoughby of Eresby, and the Lady Georgina Charlotte Bertie, sisters and co-heirs of Robert, fourth Duke of Ancaster, deceased; when after hearing all the parties at full length, in support of their several claims, the House of Peers desired the opinion of the Twelve Judges, who gave it as their opinion, that the office devolved to the Lady Willoughby of Eresby, and her sister the Lady Georgina Charlotte Bertie, as heirs to their brother Robert, Duke of Ancaster, deceased; and that they had powers to appoint a deputy to act for them, not under the degree of a Knight, who, if his Majesty approved of him, might officiate accordingly. And agreeable to this opinion the House gave judgment.

#### LORD HIGH CONSTABLE OF ENGLAND.

The Lord High Constable is the seventh Great Officer of the Crown; and he, with the Earl Marshal of England, were formerly judges of the Court of Chivalry, called, in King Henry IV.'s time, Curia Militaris, and now the Court of Honour. It is the fountain of the martial law, and anciently was holden in the King's Hall. The power of the Lord High Constable was formerly so great, and of which so improper a use was made, that so early as the 13th of King Richard II. a statute passed for regulating and abridging the same, together with the power of the Earl Marshal of England; and by this statute, no plea could be tried by them or their Courts, that could be tried by the common law of the realm. The office of Constable existed before the Conquest, and seems to have been established by our Saxon ancestors, as the word is derived from their language. After the Conquest, the office went with inheritance, and by the tenure of the manors of Harlefield, Newman, and Whitenhurst, in GloucesGloucestershire \*, by grand serjeanty in the family of the Bohuns, Earl of Hereford and Essex, and afterwards in the line of Stafford, as heirs-general to them; and in 1521, this great office became for-feited to the King in the person of Edward Stafford, Duke of Buckingham, who was that year attainted for high treason; and in consideration of its extensive power, dignity, and large authority, both in time of war and peace, it has never been granted to any person, otherwise than hac vice, and that to attend at a Coronation, or trial by combat †.

#### EARL MARSHAL OF ENGLAND.

The Earl Marshal is the eighth Great Officer of State. This office, until it was made hereditary, always passed by grant from the King, and never was held by tenure or serjeanty (by any subject), as the offices of Lord High Steward and Lord High Constable were sometimes held. The title is personal, the office honorary and officiary. They were formerly styled Lord Marshal only, until King Richard II. June 20. 1397, granted letters patent to Thomas Mowbray, Earl of Nottingham, and to the heirs-male of bis body lawfully begotten, by the name and style of Earl Marshal; and further, gave them power to bear in their hand a gold truncheon, enamelled with black at each end; having at the upper end of it the King's arms engraved thereon, and at the lower end his own arms.

King James I. was pleased, by letters-patent, dated Aug. 29. 1622, to constitute Thomas Howard, Earl of Arundel and Surrey, Earl Marshal for life; and the next year the same King granted (with the advice of the Privy Council) letters-patent, wherein it was declared, that during the vacancy of the office of Lord High Constable of England, the Earl Marshal had the like jurisdiction in the Court of Chivalry, as both Constable and Marshal jointly ever exercised.

This court is the fountain of the marshal law, and is usually held in the hall of the College of Arms before the Earl Marshal, who has the sole jurisdiction, except in matters touching life and member, which must be before the Constable and Marshal, a Constable being appointed for that time only.

Attendants on this court are the Doctors of Civil Law, the Proctors of Doctors-Commons, and the King's heralds and pursuivants of arms, who are, or ought to be, men of learning (skilled in the modern and ancient languages), good historians, and versant in the descents and genealogies of the nobility and gentry. They publish all royal proclamations; they marshal all the royal solemnities of coronations, marriages, christenings, funerals, &c.

They grant coats armorial, and supporters to the same, to such as are properly authorised to wear them.

On the 19th of October 1672, King Charles II. was pleased to grant to Henry, Lord Howard, and the heirs-male of his body lawfully begotten, the office and dignity of Earl Marshal of England, with power to execute the same by deputy or deputies, in as full and ample a manner as the same was heretofore executed by Henry Howard, Lord Maltravers, late Earl of Arundel, Surrey, and Norfolk, grandfather to the said Henry, Lord Howard; or by Thomas Howard, late Duke of Norfolk, grandfather of the said Thomas Howard. late Earl of Arundel, Surrey, and Norfolk; or by Thomas Howard, Duke of Norfolk, grandfather of the said Thomas Howard, Duke of Norfolk; or by John Mowbray, Duke of Norfolk, or any other Earl Marshal of England; with a pension of L.20 each year, payable out of the Hanaper office in Chancery; and, on default of the issue-male of the said Henry, Lord Howard, with limitation to the heirs-male lawfully begotten of the body of the said Thomas Howard, Earl of Arundel, &c.; and, on the default of such issue, to descend in like manner to the heirs-male of Thomas, late Earl of Suffolk; and on default of his issue-male, to the heirs-male of Lord William Howard, late of Naworth, in the county of Cumberland, youngest son to Henry Howard, late Duke of Norfolk; and on default of his issuemale, to Charles Howard, Earl of Nottingham, and the heirs-male of his body lawfully begotten.

#### LORD HIGH ADMIRAL OF ENGLAND.

The Lord High Admiral is the ninth Great Officer of State, and is an Officer of great trust and honour, and was formerly so great,

that this office was usually given either to some of the King's younger sons, near kinsmen, or to one of the first of the nobility. He has the management of all maritime affairs, the government of the Royal Navy; with power of decision in all maritime cases, both civil and criminal. He judges of all transgressions done upon or beyond sea, in any part of the world, upon the coasts, in all ports or havens, and upon all rivers below the first bridge from the sea. By him all Navy Officers, from an Admiral to a Lieutenant, are commissioned; all deputies for particular coasts, and coroners for viewing dead bodies found on the sea-coasts, or at sea. He also appoints the Judges for his Court of Admiralty, to imprison, release, &c.

The sea being reckoned without the limits of the common law, and under the jurisdiction of the Lord High Admiral; therefore the civil law is made use of in the Court of Admiralty. The proceedings in all civil matters are according to the civil law. This is, by libel to the action, both parties giving surety that they shall stand to the judgment of the court, and he that shall fail in the suit, pay to the other what he shall be condemned to.

But in criminal matters, such as piracy, murder, treason, &cc. the case is altered, as formerly the proceedings of this court in such cases were according to the civil law; but a statute passed in the reign of King Henry VIII. ordaining, that criminal affairs should be tried in this court, by witnesses and a jury, and this by a special commission from the King to the Lord High Admiral, whereof some of the Judges are to be Commissioners; in which case the trial is by common law, as directed by these statutes. The customs and former decrees of this court are there of force for deciding of controversies; and there is a court of equity under it, for determining differences between merchants.

Though the common law of England reaches as far as the low-water mark, being accounted intra corpus comitatis adjacentis, and causes thence arising are determinable by the common law; yet when the sea flows over the low-water mark, the Admiral has also a jurisdiction there, over matters done (while the sea flows) between the low-water mark and the land.

To the Lord High Admiral belong, by law and custom, all fines and forfeitures of all transgressions at sea, on the sea-shore, in ports, and from the first bridge on rivers toward the sea; also the goods of pirates, and felons condemned or outlawed; and all wayfs, straygoods, wrecks of sea deodants; a share of all lawful prizes, layon, jetson, and flotson; that is, goods lying in the sea, goods cast by the sea on the shore, not granted formerly, or belonging to lords or manors adjoining the sea; all great fishes, as sea-hogs, and other fishes

of extraordinary bigness, called royal fishes, whales only and sturgeons excepted.

Since the Revolution, the maritime laws have undergone many alterations, and the office of Lord High Admiral have been considerably abridged of its perquisites. Of late years this high office has always been in commission, and still remains an office of great honour, power, and profit. The first Commissioner of the Admiralty has a salary of L.3000 a-year, and the other six Commissioners L.1000 a-year each; and all of them (the youngest Commissioner excepted) has a house in the Admiralty.

### Of the Office of PRINCIPAL SECRETARY OF STATE.

The Principal Secretaries of State are, by their office, Members of the Privy Council ever since the reign of Queen Elizabeth; whereas before they only prepared business for the Council Board, in a room adjoining to the Council Chamber; which done, they came in, and stood one on the right hand, and the other on the left. And till the Secretaries had gone through with their proposals, nothing was debated at the Council Board.

Until toward the end of King Henry VIII.'s reign, there was but one Secretary of State, when his Majesty thought fit to increase the number to two, both of equal rank and authority. Upon the Union with Scotland, her Majesty Queen Anne augmented the number to three, viz. a Principal Secretary of State for Scotch affairs. appointment has since been laid aside; but in the reign of his present Majesty, the number was again increased to three, viz. one for the American department; but in the year 1782, this office was abolished by act of Parliament. At present there are again three Principal Secretaries of State; one for the northern department, or province, which includes the Low Countries, Germany, Denmark, Sweden, Poland, Russia, &c.; one for the southern department, or province, which includes France, Switzerland, Italy, Spain, Portugal, and Turkey; and one for the War Department. The affairs of Ireland and the colonies belong to the eldest Secretary. According to which division, each Secretary receives letters and dispatches from, and makes all dispatches to the several Princes and States belonging to his own province. As for home affairs, whether public or private, they equally receive and dispatch whatever is brought to them.

The office of Principal Secretary of State is deemed of the highest trust, and of great honour, and it is looked upon as of great consequence, both in the eyes of the Sovereign and people; therefore they attend him daily, as occasion requires, for domestic as well as for form

reign concerns. The requests of the subject being mostly lodged in their hands, the same are represented by the Principal Secretaries of State to the King, and the dispatches by them made according to his directions.

All grants, pardons, dispensations, &c. touching private persons, pass through their hands; likewise all military commissions, from a General to an Ensign, must be countersigned by either of them.

The Principal Secretary of State hath the custody of the Privy Signet, because the King's private letters are signed with it. There are four clerks of the Privy Signet office, who write out such grants and letters-patent as pass by bill signed, or bill superscribed by the signmanual, or under the King's hand; which being transcribed and sealed with the Signet, is a warrant to the Privy Seal, as the Privy Seal is a warrant to the Great Seal. A Ne exeat Regno may by commandment be under the Privy Signet, or the Privy Seal, as well as by the King's writ under the Great Seal, and the subjects ought to obey it. But a warrant under the Privy Signet is not sufficient to issue out any treasure, or to discharge a debt, much less an order by word of mouth; for it ought to be under the Great Scal, or at least under the Privy Seal. The signet-office is entirely under the direction of the Secretaries of State, and a clerk of the signet-office attends on the Court, wherever it may happen to reside; and he prepares such bills and letters for the King to sign, as he is directed by warrant from the King, or Secretaries of State, or Lords of the Council. All grants prepared by the clerks of the Signet, or by the King's Counsel learned in the law, for the King's hand, are returned into this office, when signed, and there transcribed again. The transcription is carried to one of the Principal Secretaries of State, and being sealed by him, it is called a Signet; which is directed to the Lord Privy Seal, and is his warrant for issuing out a Privy Seal upon it. But Privy Seals for money do now always begin in the Treasury, from whence the first warrant issues, countersigned by the Lord Treasurer, or the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury. Under the direction of the Secretaries of State is likewise the Paper-office; and here are kept all papers and dispatches that pass through the offices of the two Secretaries of State, such as matters of state and council, letters, intelligences, and negociations with foreign states, which are here disposed by way of a library at Whitehall; the kceper whereof has a salary of L.160 per aunum, payable out of the Exchequer.

In all the royal houses, they have each his apartment, as well for his own accommodation, as his office, and those that attend upon it. They have each of them two under secretaries, and clerks attending the office, and of their own choice, without any dependence upon any other. These places are of considerable profit. A Secretary of State being a Baron, takes place of all other Barons; but if above the degree of a Baron, then he takes place only according to the seniority of his creation. If a Knight, and has no other qualifications, he has the precedence of all other Knights.

With the salary and perquisites, the place of each of the Principal Secretaries of State is computed at L.8000 per annum.

#### OFFICERS OF HIS MAJESTY'S HOUSEHOLD.

#### LORD CHAMBERLAIN.

THE Lord Chamberlain of the King's House, or King's Chamberlain, or Lord Chamberlain of the Household, as he is commonly called, is an officer of great honour and trust; and his office is of very great antiquity, the title of which is from the French word Chambellan; in Latin it is called Cubicularius, or Præfectus Cubiculi, but most commonly Camerario Hospitii. He has the oversight of all the officers above stairs, except the precinct of the King's bedchamber, which is under the government of the Groom of the Stole. He has the oversight of the King's Chaplains, notwithstanding he is a layman; also of the officers of the standing and removing wardrobes, beds, tents, revels, music, comedians, hunting, and of all the physicians, apothecaries, surgeons, barbers, messengers, trumpets, drummers, tradesmen and artisans retained in his Majesty's service. All officers in his department are sworn into office by him; and they take an oath to be true to the King, and the trust reposed in them. He has L.100 wages, and L.1100 a-year board-wages In virtue of his office he precedes Dukes; and he is always of the Privy Council, and wears a gold key as the emblem of his office.

Under the Lord Chamberlain is a Vice-Chamberlain, who, in absence of the former, supplies his place, and is vested with the same powers. He has L.600 a-year wages, and L.550:8:4 a-year board-wages. He is likewise always a member of the Privy Council.

#### GROOM OF THE STOLE.

The Groom of the Stole is first Lord of the Bed-chamber, and by his office has the custody of the long robe or vestment worn by the King on solemn occasions, and called the Stole. He has the direction of all things relating to the King's bed-chamber. It is his office to present or put on the King's shirt every morning. In his absence, this is done by one of the Lords of the bed-chamber. He wears a gold key as his emblem of office, and has a salary of L.2000 a year.

#### LORD STEWARD of the HOUSEHOLD'S Department.

The Lord Steward of the Household is an employment of great trust, dignity, and antiquity. He has the sole direction of the King's house below stairs. He has no formal grant of his office; but receives his charge immediately from the King in person, who delivering to him a white staff or wand (the symbol of his office) says, Seneschal tenez te Baton de Notre Maison. By which he is also Steward of the Marchelsea, or Court of the Household, of which he is Judge of Life and Limb. In his absence, the Treasurer and Comptroller for the time being are Judges of the Marchelsea, or the Court of Verge. His authority is very great, and extends over the following great offices, viz. the Treasurer, Comptroller, Cofferer \*, Master of the Household, Clerks of the Board of Green Cloth \*, and Clerks Comptrollers of ditto \*, and all the inferior officers in their departments. In his department is the Counting-house, where all expences of the King's household are there daily taken by the Lord Steward, and the above-named officers. In room of the Cofferer is a Paymaster of the household, with a salary of L.450 for himself and Clerks. In room of the Clerks and Clerks Comptrollers of the Green Cloth, are two Clerks of the household; the first with a salary of L.500, and the other of L.400. They have three under Clerks, with a salary of L.150 each. By these the business of the Green Cloth is conducted, as it used to be, except that the Avenor to the Master of the Horse, who formerly laid his accounts of the stables, &c. now does not. Latin he is styled Seneschallus Hospitii.

In the Counting-house is the Board of Green Cloth, which is a Court of Justice daily sitting in the King's Palace, consisting of the above-mentioned officers, and the Steward of the Marchelsea, who is always a Barrister of Law, who meet for the following purposes:

- 1. For taking daily the accounts of all expences of the household.
- 2. For making of provisions for the household.
- 3. For making payment of the same.
- 4. For the good government of the King's servants of the house-hold.
- 5. The Cofferer is to pay the wages of the King's servants under the Lord Steward.

This is one of the most ancient courts in England, and has jurisdiction of all offences committed in the King's palaces, and verge of the Court. It is called the Green Cloth, from the table whereat they sit being covered with a green cloth; and without a warrant from this Court, none of the King's servants can be arrested for debt.

By the direction of this Board, the Cofferer pays the wages of the King's servants above and below stairs, and the bills for provisions. Also before this Board the Avenor to the Master of the Horse lays

These offices are now abolished.

the accounts of the stables, for horse-meat, livery-wages, and board-wages, in order to be passed and allowed.

The Lord Steward, by his office, precedes all Dukes, not of the royal blood. He is always a member of the Privy Council; and at the meeting of every new Parliament, all the members must take the oaths by law appointed, before the Lord Steward of his Majesty's household, or some one deputed by him for this purpose.

At the end of each session of Parliament, he adjudges the Parliament expences, &c.

The Lord Steward has L.100 a-year wages, and L.1360 a-year board-wages, and a farther salary of L.1540 payable at the Exchequer.

He is a sort of deputy to the Lord Steward, as in his absence he may, with the Comptroller and Steward of the Marchelsea, in virtue of his office, hear and determine treasons, felonies, and other offences done and committed within the King's palace; and if any servant within the check-roll be found guilty, he is incapable of the benefit of the clergy.

#### MASTER OF THE HORSE.

The Master of the Horse to the King, is reckoned the third great officer of the Court, and is an office of great honour and antiquity, and always (when not put in commission) filled by noblemen of the highest rank and abilities. He has the management and disposal of all the

the King's stables and bred horses. He has authority over the equerries and pages, coachmen, footmen, grooms, riders of the great horse, farriers, and smiths. He appoints all the other tradesmen who work for the King's stables; and by his warrant to the avenor, makes them give an oath to be true and faithful. In short, he is entrusted with all the lands and revenues appropriated for the King's breed of horses, the expences of the stable, and of the coaches, litters, &cc.

He alone has the privilege of making use of any of the King's horses, pages, footmen, &c. and at any solemn cavalcade he rides next the King, and leads a horse of state.

His salary is L.1276: 13:4 per annum.

#### YEOMEN OF THE GUARD.

The Yeomen of the Guard were first instituted by King Henry VII. in 1486, as a body guard to him. Their establishment was at first fifty men. They have since that time undergone several alterations in point of numbers; but at present their establishment is one hundred men, at L.39: 11: 4 a-year each. Eight of that number are styled usbers, and have L.10 a-year each more than the rest. Four superannuated yeomen, at L.25 a-year each; six yeomen hangers, and two yeomen bed-goers, at L.10 a-year each. The officers are a Captain, who has L.1000 a-year salary; a Lieutenant, who has L.500; an Ensign, who has L.300; a Clerk of the Cheque, who has L.150, and four Exons, who have L.150 a-year salary each.

The Yeomen of the Guard wait in the first room above stairs, which is called the Guard-chamber. Forty wait by day, and twenty by night, with partizans, and large swords by their sides. They bring up the dishes for his Majesty's table, deliver them to the servers, who place them on the table; and when the King goes abroad by land or water, they attend his person.

They still retain the ancient dress assigned them by King Henry VII. viz. a scarlet coat, of a peculiar make, down to the knees, garded with black velvet, and badges on the coat, before and behind. Their breeches are also scarlet, garded with black velvet; and instead of hats, they wear black velvet caps, round and broad crowned, with ribbons of the King's colour.

#### GENTLEMEN PENSIONERS.

The band of Gentlemen Pensioners was instituted by King Henry VIII. in 1509. It consists of forty gentlemen, who are entitled Esquires. Their office is to attend the King's person, with their pole-axes, to and from his Chapel Royal, and receive him in the Presence-chamber, or coming out of his privy lodgings. They likewise attend at all great solemnities, as coronations, St George's feast, public audiences of Ambassadors, at the King's going to Patliament, Royal funerals, &c. &c. Their salary is L.100 a-year each. They wait twenty at a time, quarterly; but upon public occasions they all give attendance.

On the coronation-day, and at St George's feast, they have the honour to carry up the King's dinner.

Their offices are a Captain, who has L.1000 a year salary; a Lieutenant, who has L.510; a Standard-bearer, who has L.310; a Clerk of the Cheque, who has L.120. There is also a Secretary, a Paymaster, and a Harbinger, whose office it is to provide lodgings for the Gentlemen Pensioners, and to assist the Clerk of the Cheque, when absent, as his deputy.




